<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Apply their growing knowledge of root words, prefixes and suffixes (morphology and etymology), both to read aloud and to understand the meaning of new words that they meet.</li> </ul>	<p>Maintain positive attitudes to reading and understanding of what they read by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>continuing to read and discuss an increasingly wide range of fiction, poetry, plays, non-fiction and reference books or textbooks</li> <li>reading books that are structured in different ways and reading for a range of purposes</li> <li>increasing their familiarity with a wide range of books, including myths, legends and traditional stories, modern fiction, fiction from our literary heritage, and books from other cultures and traditions</li> <li>recommending books that they have read to their peers, giving reasons for their choices</li> <li>identifying and discussing themes and conventions in and across a wide range of writing</li> <li>making comparisons within and across books</li> <li>learning a wider range of poetry by heart</li> <li>preparing poems and plays to read aloud and to perform, showing understanding through intonation, tone and volume so that the meaning is clear to an audience</li> </ul> <p>Understand what they read by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>checking that the book makes sense to them, discussing their understanding and exploring the meaning of words in context</li> <li>asking questions to improve their understanding</li> <li>drawing inferences such as inferring characters’ feelings, thoughts and motives from their actions, and justifying inferences with evidence</li> <li>predicting what might happen from details stated and implied</li> <li>summarising the main ideas drawn from more than one paragraph, identifying key details that support the main ideas</li> <li>identifying how language, structure and presentation contribute to meaning</li> </ul> <p>Discuss and evaluate how authors use language, including figurative language, considering the impact on the reader</p> <p>Distinguish between statements of fact and opinion</p> <p>Retrieve, record and present information from non-fiction</p> <p>Participate in discussions about books that are read to them and those they can read for themselves, building on their own and others’ ideas and challenging views courteously</p> <p>Explain and discuss their understanding of what they have read, including through formal presentations and debates, maintaining a focus on the topic and using notes where necessary</p> <p>Provide reasoned justifications for their views.</p>

<p>Write legibly, fluently and with increasing speed by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>choosing which shape of a letter to use when given choices and deciding whether or not to join specific letters</li> <li>Choosing the writing implement that is best suited for a task.</li> </ul>	<p>Plan their writing by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>identifying the audience for and purpose of the writing, selecting the appropriate form and using other similar writing as models for their own</li> <li>noting and developing initial ideas, drawing on reading and research where necessary</li> <li>in writing narratives, considering how authors have developed characters and settings in what pupils have read, listened to or seen performed</li> </ul> <p>Draft and write by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>selecting appropriate grammar and vocabulary, understanding how such choices can change and enhance meaning</li> <li>in narratives, describing settings, characters and atmosphere and integrating dialogue to convey character and advance the action</li> <li>using a wide range of devices to build cohesion within and across paragraphs</li> <li>using further organisational and presentational devices to structure text and to guide the reader [for example, headings, bullet points, underlining]</li> </ul> <p>Evaluate and edit by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>assessing the effectiveness of their own and others’ writing</li> <li>proposing changes to vocabulary, grammar and punctuation to enhance effects and clarify meaning</li> <li>ensuring the consistent and correct use of tense throughout a piece of writing</li> <li>ensuring correct subject and verb agreement when using singular and plural, distinguishing between the language of speech and writing and choosing the appropriate register</li> <li>proof-read for spelling and punctuation errors</li> </ul>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Listen and respond appropriately to adults and their peers</li> <li>Ask relevant questions to extend their understanding and knowledge</li> <li>Use relevant strategies to build their vocabulary</li> <li>Articulate and justify answers, arguments and opinions</li> <li>Give well-structured descriptions, explanations and narratives for different purposes, including for expressing feelings</li> <li>Maintain attention and participate actively in collaborative conversations, staying on topic and initiating and responding to comments</li> <li>Use spoken language to develop understanding through speculating, hypothesising, imagining and exploring ideas</li> <li>Speak audibly and fluently with an increasing command of Standard English</li> <li>Participate in discussions, presentations, performances, role play, improvisations and debates</li> <li>Gain, maintain and monitor the interest of the listener(s)</li> <li>Consider and evaluate different viewpoints, attending to and building on the contributions of others</li> <li>Select and use appropriate registers for effective communication.</li> </ul>
