This leaflet is designed to share with you the standards of behaviour and attitude that is expected of your child at our school.


It is very important that we work together to maintain the high standards of behaviour we already have in school and that all children clearly understand what is expected of them.

In Year 6, we have all agreed that the following behaviour will be rewarded.

Acting as positive role models and representatives of BGPS through exemplary behaviour.

Being polite, kind, helpful and respectful.

Always working hard whilst allowing other pupils to do the same.

Cooperating with other pupils and staff in order to create a positive learning environment.

Being prepared, being ready and being smart.

Speaking clearly and thoughtfully in sentences.

Talking about the right things at the right times at the right volume!

Actively participating in learning and using one's initiative.

Keeping yourself and others safe in the classroom. Being alert for any dangers!



Behaviour and rewards

Children will collect individual stars in order to achieve a bronze, silver and gold award over the school year.

Bronze award = 50 stars Silver award = 100 stars

Gold award = 200 stars

Platinum awards will also be available for exceptional behaviour and progress.

Stars will be given by adults for a range of behaviours that have been agreed and shared with the children in each year group.

Details for your child are shown on the next page.

There will be a series of reward assemblies throughout the year to recognise those children that achieve their rewards by the 'challenge date'.

Unacceptable behaviour will not be tolerated and all incidents will be recorded on the behaviour log and parents informed. Unacceptable behaviour includes:

- Violent behaviour
- Stealing
- Bullying
- Deliberately damaging/defacing equipment/property
- Disobedience – persistent refusal to follow instructions from an adult
- Racism
- Fighting

In addition, a system of red and yellow cards will be used during playtime and lunchtime and during lessons to deal with unacceptable behaviour. Children will be shown a yellow card as a warning that their behaviour is unacceptable. If the behaviour continues a red card will be given. All red card incidents will be recorded on the behaviour log and parents will be informed.

Good behaviour

In Year 6 we have agreed that when everyone in the class has achieved:

- Bronze award - They will have golden time in class.
- Silver award - They will have time outdoors.
- Gold award - They will have a treat at a local shop.

Golden time is when the children decide the fun activity they wish to take part in. It could be the use of laptops, DVDs, a game in the playground, etc.

Daily or weekly good behaviour by everybody in the class is rewarded with a short class game at the end of the day (when possible).

Unacceptable behaviour

- If a child's behaviour is unacceptable, the consequences shall be:
 - Children will initially receive a verbal warning.
 - If behaviour remains unchanged, time out in class, or in another classroom, will be implemented.
 - If the unacceptable behaviour persists, the child will lose part of their playtime or lunchtime.
 - A temporary loss of classroom jobs/responsibilities, or from participation in 'out-of-school' clubs, or in representing the school in sports events, could take place.
 - A record of unacceptable behaviour will be kept in the Class Behaviour Book

Parents will be informed by the class teacher if there is persistent unacceptable behaviour.

Homework not being returned on time (with no valid reason) will result in children completing it during breaktime. Parents will be informed if a child persistently fails to return their homework.
